### Recap CPRAC Progress

### Recap - CPRAC Progress, 2023-2024

- In 2023: held orientations for statutory members, established five subject-area Committees for focused discussion on ways to reduce child poverty, and developed specific proposals for further analysis
- In 2024: analyzed individual proposals, discussed policy priorities, created different packages of proposals to reduce child poverty, developed initial recommendations based on that data, issued report summarizing progress and initial recommendations

### Recap – CPRAC Progress, 2025

- In 2025, primary focus tracking/reacting to Federal landscape, while continuing to advance/resume ongoing CPRAC workstreams:
  - Reconvened Employment and Childhood Committees
  - Discussed Federal updates, impact on CPRAC work/strategy
  - Focus for now: reach eligible New Yorkers with existing programs
  - Reviewed CTC research from scholars and govt practitioner (MN)
  - Brainstormed ideas: reduce CTC admin burden, increase take-up

February	✓ CPRAC Meeting to issue the 2025 Executive Budget Report
April	✓ Employment Committee reconvenes to discuss policies for modeling
May	✓ Childhood Committee reconvenes to discuss policies for modeling
June	✓ CPRAC Meeting to discuss Federal Context
July	* President Trump signs the OBBBA/HR1 into law*
September	* President Trump and Congress fail to reach budget deal, leading to Federal government shutdown*
October	✓ CPRAC Meeting to discuss Child Tax Credit outreach/promotion
<b>November</b>	Review draft report summarizing CPRAC progress
December	Review and vote to issue report summarizing CPRAC progress

### Recap – Meeting 15

- Briefing on OBBBA/HR1 passed July 2025 \$ cannot be backfilled
- SNAP
  - Shifting responsibility = \$1.4B additional annual cost for NYS
  - Punitive requirements = >340K lose SNAP (>\$900M benefits lost)
  - Lost revenue for food supply chain, local economies
- Medicaid
  - Cut \$ billions from NYS Essential Plan, hospitals, health systems
  - 1.5M to lose Medicaid or EP coverage and become uninsured
  - Total: Almost \$13B hit to New York and its healthcare system

### Recap – Meeting 15

- Devyani Singh from New America
  - Research on tax credit take-up
  - Findings related to awareness of tax credits
  - Reasons respondents choose not to file (fear, cost concerns, gathering documents, etc.)
  - Ideas for improving tax credit uptake (tailored messages, reframing messaging around filing, reduce documentation, etc.)

### Recap – Meeting 15

- Audel Shokohzadeh from Minnesota Department of Revenue
  - Overview of Minnesota's CTC outreach strategies
  - Impacts of clear messaging and easy-to-use tools
  - Promotion should be informed by the steps in the tax filing journey
  - Convey clear consistent message across all channels
  - Easy-to-use tools should help families weigh options and file
  - Incentivize/mobilize trusted messengers to echo clear message

  - Applaud NYS Actions significant progress in right direction
  - Stand by recommendations issued in 2024 to reach 50% target
  - More to do additional ideas recommended for consideration

### 3. Next Steps

- Monitoring, measuring, and modeling to continue in 2026
  - Continue committee conversations to develop additional ideas
  - Iterative modeling additional proposals to compliment recs/enacteds
  - Compare projections to Census data released starting Nov 2026
  - Closely track changing Federal landscape safety net impacts
